



Tyndale Catch-Up Premium Strategy

The government has provided £1 billion of funding to support children and young people to catch up after the disruption to schools during the Summer 2020 COVID-19 'lockdown'. This includes a one-off universal £650 million catch-up premium for the 2020 to 2021 academic year to ensure schools have the support they need to help all pupils make up for lost teaching time. Alongside this, the government launched the £350 million National Tutoring Programme to provide additional, targeted support for those children and young people who need the most help.

In the 2020-21, academic year, Tyndale received: **£12,240**

As of 11.12.20, we have allocated the funding in the following ways:

Additional Teacher time to provide 1:1 and group support in KS2	£11,515
Extended School Day Year 6	£1, 152
Total	£12,667

The children are assessed on an on-going basis with summative assessments made at the end of each Teaching and learning cycle. In addition, we use Salford tests in reading alongside Test Base produced questions in grammar, punctuation and spelling and mathematics to inform teacher judgements. These tests provide a 'standardised score' and 'question level analysis' allowing us to track progress and identify gaps.
